USING THIS STUDY

The Hebrews were great story tellers, and I believe that the most benefit is gained from those Scriptures when they are read as whole stories. This study booklet is designed to give you the bigger picture, to enable you to learn from the good and bad examples of the characters in 1 Samuel, and more importantly to discover that God is always at work even when circumstances seem to indicate otherwise.

Because there are a number of chapters to read each week, it is important that each member of the group prepares well and is reasonably familiar with the content of each study. However the text for the first study can be read together as a group.

INTRODUCTION

After the Israelites left Egypt, conquered and settled in the land of Canaan, there followed the period of around 400 years when the twelve tribes had no king and did what was right in their own eyes. Although God was the Lord who linked these tribes they soon turned to the idolatry of the people they had conquered. What followed was a cycle of invasion from neighbouring non-Israelite tribes, the Israelites calling out to God for help, and God raising up a Judge (a charismatic leader) who united some of the tribes under God, to defeat the enemy. Peace followed for a time until Israel lapsed into her old ways, and the cycle continued.

Samuel comes at the end of this period of the Judges. His story ushers in the age of the kings and he is presented as a priest, prophet and the last of the Judges.



1 SAMUEL 27 to 31 The End of Saul In chapters 27&29 do you think David was wrong in his deception with Achish?

In 28:4-6 Why does God not give guidance to Saul? How does this chapter emphasize Saul's powerlessness?

In what ways does David show wisdom as a leader in chapter 30?

Is there anything else that strikes you from these chapters?

In chapters 24 & 26 how does David demonstrate his respect for authority? Why should he do so when Saul has been rejected by God? What may we learn about our own attitudes to those who have authority over us?



Read 1 Samuel 1 The birth of Samuel

What do you learn of Hanna's & Elkanah's relationship?

From verse 11, was Hanna bargaining with God? What do you think about that?

In chapter 25 Compare the characteristics of Nabal, Abigail and David.. What may we learn from Abigail's example? The Bible gives us the birth narratives of Moses, John the Baptist, Jesus, and here, Samuel. It doesn't give us a birth narrative of kings Saul or David.

Why do think Samuel is given this emphasis above Saul and David?

From verse 11 we see that Samuel was to be a Nazirite. See Numbers 6:1-8 and Judges 13:2-7, 24. What does this tell you about Samuel's future role?



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1 SAMUEL 4-7 The Ark and the Philistines

Israel had experienced conflict with various neighbouring tribes, but the wars with the Philistines, occupying the coast were the most enduring. They had weapons of iron and chariots, while the Israelites largely made do with wooden weapons and farm implements.

The ark had made by Israel according to God's instructions through Moses, during their time in the wilderness.

What was its significance? Exodus 25:10-22,

Joshua 3:3, 11, 14-17

Why didn't it work for them now as it had in times past?


